We are happy that there are still among us those special few who remember how to use these gifts you have given. So, with one mind we send our greeting and thanks. Report from President

Rev. Linda Buchanan

I will start my time by reading part of an email written to the Planning Team from Rev. Ellie Hummel. I will not read it all, but enough for her concerns to be heard.

I think most of you are aware that I will be leaving the Nakhonka Region in early March, as I have taken on a new position as Multi-faith Chaplain and Spiritual Care Coordinator at Mt. Allison University within the Fundy St. Lawrence Dawning Waters Regional Council.

Nakhonka Region, first presbyteries and then the regional council, have been part of my life for over 22 years. I have many memories of meetings and events, and have learned much about myself and ministry while being among you. For that I am truly grateful.

As I leave, I also would like to offer a reflection: A lot of my work as university chaplain is about relationship building, in particular as it relates to people of different faiths and racial backgrounds, and also in terms of indigenous relations. I am also a member of the United Church's national Anti-Racism Common Table. During the last few meetings of our regional council, I have thought much about how we walk the path to reconciliation with our Kanien'kéha sisters and brothers. The last two meetings, we invited a Kanien'kéha person to open the meeting with a welcome to the land and the Great Thanksgiving. Both times, as I was listening on the zoom screen, there was an unease about it. I wondered if it wasn't up to us as settlers to acknowledge the land we are on. The Great Thanksgiving, while wonderful words, left me feeling that I was part of someone else sacred ritual without really understanding it, neither with my mind nor my heart.

Thank you Ellie

Over my time as president I have learnt more about the call to reconciliation with the first peoples of this land, and I have unlearned some things too. I am grateful for the faithful participation by Robert on both the Planning Team and the Worship Team, which has led to learning and transformation over the past year. A little while ago I asked the Living Into Right Relations Leadership Circle to help us, in particular, with how we acknowledge this call to reconciliation at the start of every regional council meeting. And instead of providing me with a paragraph to read, they gave an whole workshop that can be shared with every community of faith within our Regional Council. This workshop has already transformed our approach, evident in the words before all words today. But it is also clear to me that this journey has just begun.

I have been intentional throughout the past, almost, 3 years, to never call us a region. A region is a location and we are a people. This Regional Council is a community of people doing their best to build relationships in the way of Christ. And this spring, I will take my leave as president of this regional council and I do so joyfully trusting in what we have begun. We are not a court, we are a council in a conciliar model, with a call to move into the kind of leadership that lives out this model which holds emphasis on shared leadership. I have given the gifts I had to give to this time and this community, and Bold Discipleship calls me to step back so that another might do the same, giving their own gifts to this Regional Council. And I hope that this will continue, as we all contemplate our own gifts in leadership, so that we can give our gifts to our Regional Council, we must take turns in the president chair, so that throughout time better consensus will be created.

I thank you for letting me bring my full and authentic self to this task, and I am grateful for the people who

have helped, encouraged and supported me throughout, especially to the staff who serve with great compassion.

Rev. Barbara Bryce highlighted items in the Granting and Enabling Leadership Team report to the Regional Council found in the report book (**Appendix B**) on page 13, and also brought the following motions:

2022-03-11-12_004 MOTION (B. Bryce/F. Braman) that the Conseil régional Nakonha:ka Regional Council:

Receive for information from the Granting and Enabling Team the following distribution from the Kelley Trust Fund

1. Ayer's Cliff, Magog, Georgeville Pastoral Charge: Pastoral Care Course: \$350
2. Montreal City Mission: A Movable Feast: \$3,000

Receive the recommendation from the Granting and Enabling Team regarding the Erskine & American – Mountainside fund and approve the following distribution:

1. Cedar Park United Church: Reconciliation Matters Gardens: \$5,000
N.B.: Restoration and repurposing of old garden with indigenous themes.
2. Living into Right Relations: Native Women's Shelter of Montreal: \$30,000
N.B.: This amount was granted in January 2022 as an emergency request. As it forms part of the 2022 distribution of E &A – M funds, it is included here so the financial balance is accurate. The Trustees noted at their meeting last week that this group can return at a later date with a new application if funding is still a concern.
3. Montreal City Mission: Holistic Reconciliation with Newcomer Families Phase Two: \$19,500

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- N.B.: Phase Two: Going deeper with outreach to Nigerian refugee group at Beaconsfield United Church. The Committee applauds sessions informing other communities of faith, to sensitize the non-refugee communities of this important endeavour. Continued invitation to share learning through audio-visual tools.
4. Saint Columba House: Promoting healthy nutrition and physical activity habits among children: \$10,000
N.B.: The Committee granted \$10,000 of the approximately \$17,000 requested. The Trustees are willing to consider the balance, and perhaps more, at the next round of applications in May, provided the Applicant indicates the faith rationale as well as the concrete measures that make the faith aspects of the project fully explicit to participants in the community. This is to differentiate the program from state-funded public health initiatives. This Trust is mandated to fund projects in transformational ministry and outreach ministry. A project should explicitly identify with either or both of these objectives. We invite a sharing of results, as well.
5. St. James United Church: St. James United/Multifaith Federation/Sisters of Sion Multifaith Library: \$20,000
N.B.: Second phase of project, adding another important faith collection and integrating with inter faith activities, including proper display of books and materials.
6. United Theological College: Montreal Mission Internship: \$5,000
N.B.: Internships in a number of Montreal missions for 12 young adults (18-25) in cooperation with other foundations. Bravo!
7. West Island LGBTQ2+ Centre: Youth Based Programming and Youth Outreach: \$35,000
N.B.: Phase two of ongoing project.
The amount granted to date for 2022 is \$124,500 and the remaining balance available for 2022 is \$94,390.

N.B.: a revision to the terms of the Erskine & American – Mountainside Trust, effective February 2022, now allows the carry-forward of unused funds from the immediately previous year to the current year. The starting balance for 2022 was therefore \$218,890, consisting of 2021's remaining balance of \$37,012, plus available funds for 2022 of \$181,878.

Receive the recommendation from the Granting and Enabling Team regarding Good Samaritan Fund and approve the following distribution:

- Auberge Madeleine: Shelter and Counsel for Senior Women: \$20,000
- Saint Columba House: Seniors CARE Project: \$33,188
- St. Paul's United Church, Magog: Healthy Seniors' Living Exercise Program: \$12,622
- Richmond-Melbourne United Church: Seniors' Spiritual Wellness Program: \$25,000
- West Island LGBTQ2+ Centre: West Island Rainbow Seniors: \$25,000
- Montreal City Mission: What if Seniors Mattered?: \$25,000
- Westmount Park United Church Contactivity Centre: Break out after the Pandemic: \$35,000, conditional on submission of financial statements
- Montreal West United Church: Extra Miles Senior Visiting Program: \$15,000
- Riverside United Church: Riverside Cares: \$30,000

N.B. With the above grants amounting to \$220,810 plus the previous grant of \$15,000 in January to the Native Women's Shelter of Montreal, the 2022 total of Good Samaritan Fund grants is \$235,810. Starting in 2022, the United Church of Canada Foundation Board has approved raising the base granting rate to 4.25% , based on the average value of the fund over the last eight quarters. As a result, the minimum grant amount for 2022 has been determined to be \$313,203.16.

Receive the recommendation from the Granting and Enabling Team regarding Trois-Rivières French Ministry Fund and approve the following distribution:
